Start saving now and save regularly. Saving on a regular basis provides a steady investment into your retirement future.


Direct Deposit Your Tax Refund

Having your tax return directly deposited into your Credit Union account is quick, easy, convenient, and best of all, FREE! Why wait around for your refund check to be mailed when you can start spending (or saving!) right away?

According to the IRS, a refund check is issued to you within six to eight weeks of filing a paper return. By choosing direct deposit your paper-filed return, it will be received in five to six weeks. To have your tax refund directly deposited into your Credit Union account, simply provide your tax preparer with your account number and our routing number. #2360-8407-8.

If you choose to E-file, you can always check the status of your refund Online at www.irs.gov. To do so, you will need your Social Security number and filing status.Also, remember to keep your year-end credit union statement for tax reporting purposes!

Snowy Facts


- ✓ On an average, 10 inches of snow is equivalent to 1 inch of rain.
- ✓ Around 9,000 tons of snow are used each year to build a castle for the Winter Carnival in Quebec City, Quebec, Canada.
- ✓ No two snow crystals are alike; they differ from each other in size, lacy structure, and surface markings.
- ✓ As snow falls, snowflakes connect to make bigger snowflakes.
- ✓ Even though snow is cold, it protects plants and small animals that live underground.
- ✓ The largest snowflakes ever recorded fell in the state of Montana. The snowflakes were 15 inches in diameter.
- ✓ Almost 187 inches of snow fell in seven days on Thompson Pass, Alaska in February 1953.
- ✓ The snow capital of the United States is Stampede Pass, Washington. The yearly average snowfall is 430 inches.



Watch It Grow



Here And Around The World

Every year on New Year's Eve, millions of Americans watch the ball drop in New York City's Times Square. In Seattle, the countdown is done by launching fireworks up the side of the Space Needle until it reaches the top at midnight. In Las Vegas, Nevada, Las Vegas Boulevard is shut down as several hundred thousand people celebrate. Many cities in America have their own local version of the celebration. And around the world, other countries have their own traditions:

- ✓ Crowds gather around the Sydney Harbour Bridge in Sydney, Australia, to see over 80,000 fireworks set off from the bridge.
- ✓ In London, the London Eye (the largest observation wheel in the world) is the center point of a huge ten-minute fireworks display each year, illuminated with colored lasers.
- ✓ In parts of South America, people make an effigy (dummy) of a person out of old clothes stuffed with newspapers and firecrackers. At midnight, the dummy is set on fire, symbolizing that the old year is going up in smoke.
- ✓ In Scotland, the New Year's Eve celebration is called Hogmanay and about 100,000 people crowd the streets of Edinburgh and Glasgow for dancing and celebrating.

Beginning in 2007, Daylight Savings Time is extended one month - it starts at 2 a.m. on the second Sunday in March and ends at 2 a.m. on the first Sunday in November. The new times were set in the Energy Policy Act of 2005.

Top Five Most Common Tax Mistakes

- Simple math errors. Always check and recheck your math calculations (addition, multiplication, and subtraction).
- **☑** Entering incorrect Social Security numbers. Double-check all the SSNs on your return. All must be correct in order to process the return.
- **E** Every dependent claimed on your return even a new baby must have a Social Security number.
- Don't forget to include interest income, dividends, and capital gains. All financial institutions report these amounts to IRS.
- Last but not least don't forget to sign your return.

Tips for Driving in Snow

Winter is here, and that means snow. If you have to drive in the snow, your credit union offers these tips:

Turn your lights on — day as well as night.

When traveling on slick surfaces, use low gears. You will have more traction.

Don't tailgate. Drive slowly.

Avoid turning your wheel suddenly. Accelerate gradually. Sudden movements can cause skidding.

If it starts snowing before you start driving, try to wait until one or two inches of snow have fallen before driving. Dry snow on the road can actually provide more traction than spotty snow coverage.
